



Psychologists tell us that human intelligence is fundamentally pattern oriented for survival -- we know "this shape" means "tiger", while "that shape" means "deer". We know "this smell" means ripe fruit while "that smell" means rancid meat. The more

information we have, the more specific that information, the safer we are. "This sound" is an owl, "that sound" is a wolf. But the more information we acquire, the more we have to

organize it, otherwise it's just a big mess. (Anyone beside me own the cartons of unsorted family photos going back a few generations?)

Psychologists tell us we love libraries because they make us feel safe: masses of information, all organized, all rapidly available at hand, leading us toward food and away from predators.

But libraries can't just hoard information. The

library is the quiet heart of knowledge and community, offering a haven where the curious converge to learn, to discuss, to create. We expect our librarians to encourage and support us and our children in learning and growing. In 1212, the Council of Paris condemned

any monasteries that forbade loaning books, reminding them that lending is "one of the chief works of mercy."

As we move from clay tablets to Windows tablets, there is so

much information to deal with! It's no wonder we're overwhelmed by the tsunami of news, fake news, yesterday's news, tomorrow's weather, and turn to pictures of cats, if only just occasionally. But humans have an uncanny knack for getting things figured out eventually, and you know the library is going to be there, right in the middle, gathering, organizing, and leading the way.

The Night the Light Went Out




